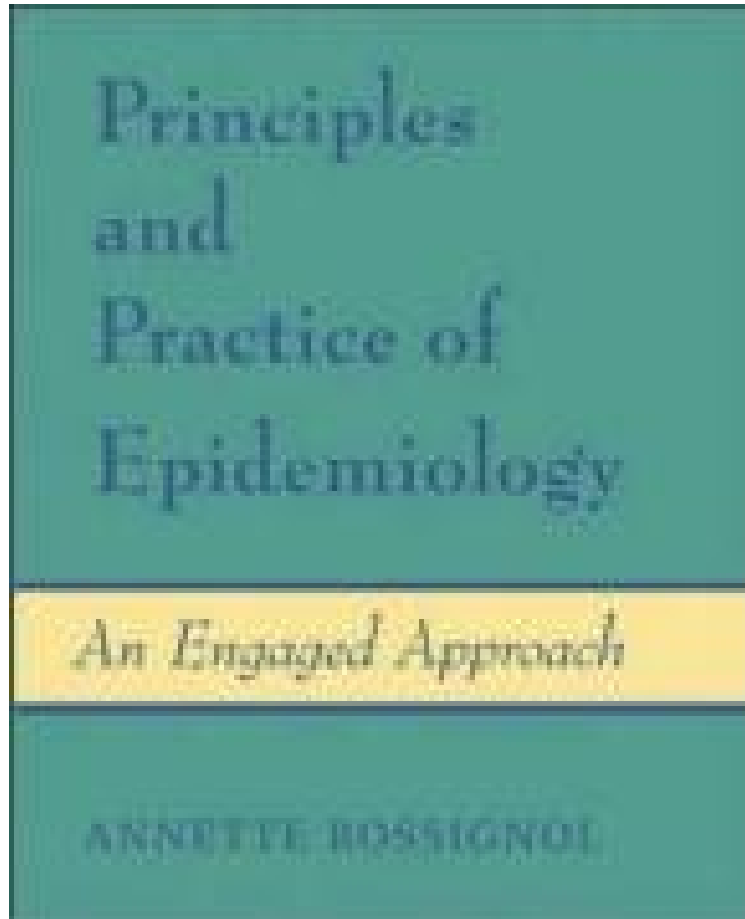

Epidemiology is one of the most difficult topics because it requires an understanding of difficult and subtle mathematical approaches but also must have direct relevance to population health. Most people, even scientists, use epidemiologic jargon without understanding it, such as the pervasive confusion of 'incidence' and 'prevalence'. This text will not only explain these terms, but goes well beyond and illustrates their relevance and use with real world problems and situations. Dr. Rossignol is a Harvard trained epidemiologist and has carried out epidemiologic studies around the world. Her experience and knowledge shine through. It's the best current text on the topic.

She received her B.A. in philosophy from Wellesley College and went on to receive her M.S. and D.Sc. in Epidemiology from Harvard School of Public Health. Her research focuses broadly on issues in environmental epidemiology and on burn injury epidemiology. She is a senior editorial board member for *Burns* and recently was awarded Oregon's The Ray Ruff Editorial Award for the development of public health educational materials. Formerly, she served as the chair of the Department of Public Health at OSU and later as the interim associate dean for research and graduate studies for the College of Health and Human Performance (now the College of Health and Human Sciences).
