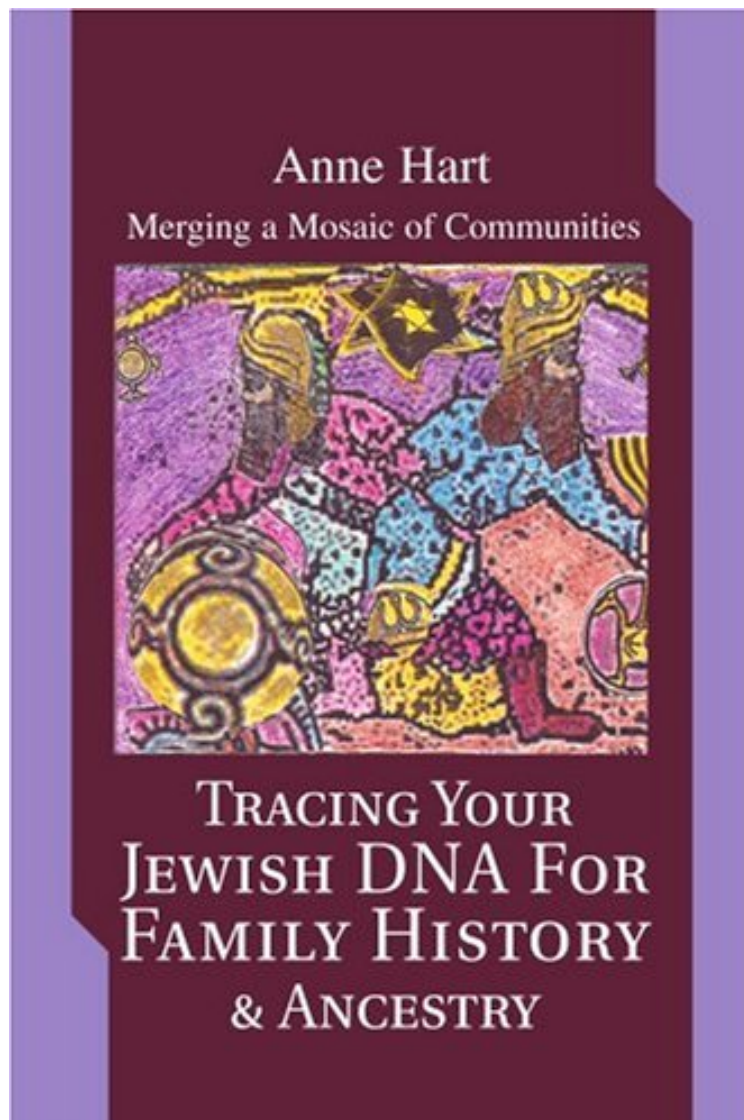

The subject described in the title and the anotation is not analysed adequately at all (better to say is not analysed at all). There are "empty" unsubstantial chapters, there are identical paragraphs, there are lists of non-relevant "sources" to increase a number of pages etc. Therefore my ranking is ZERO stars.
