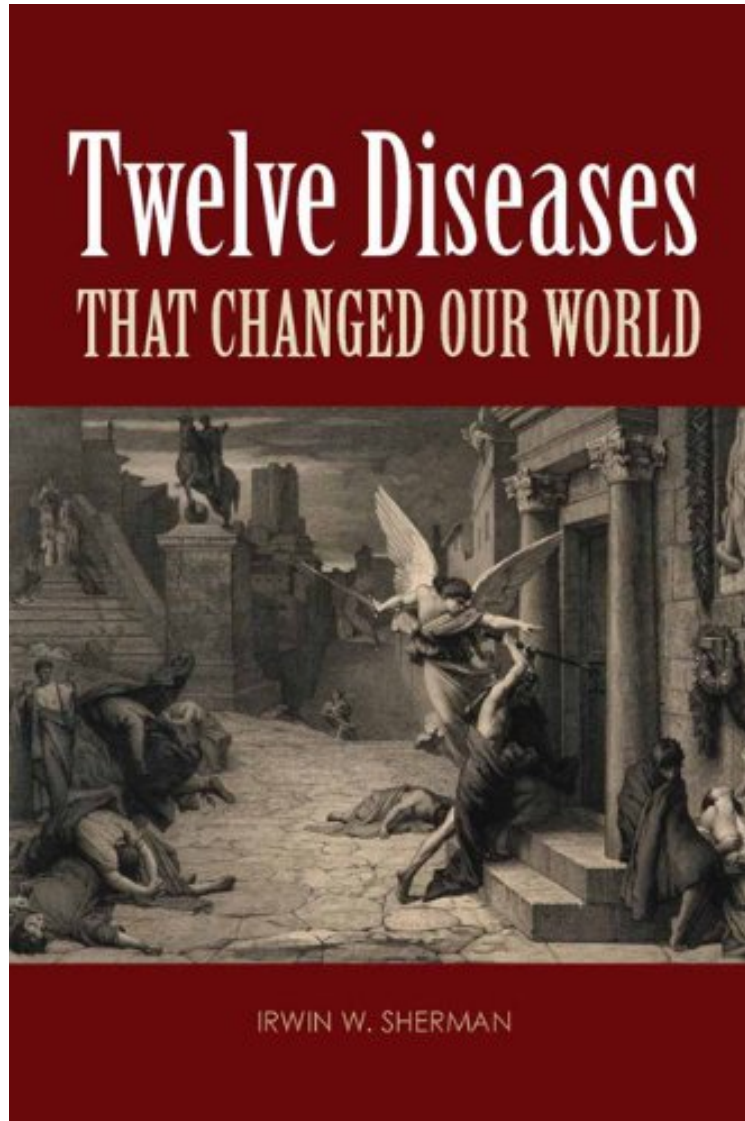

It seems to impute the cause of the Famine to the blight, rather than to the political ideologies of the British Empire.
